## WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

> Remarks from Chair- Chair Andy Nowel welcomed everyone back for
$>$ Dr. Barbara Kirby, Associate Vice Provost- Dr. Kirby reminded the committee to submit actions as soon as possible. The earlier actions are submitted, the better, particularly for new courses or actions. Dr. Kirby encouraged the committee to address courses within their respective colleges, which have not been offered in 5 years, as these can create errors within SIS.
> Approval of the Minutes from December $14^{\text {th }} 2016$ - Approved Unanimously
o Discussion: Member Helmut Hergeth moved to approve. Minutes from the previous meeting were presented and approved without further discussion.

## NEW BUSINESS

> Consent Agenda-Approved Unanimously
Discussion: Member Kathleen Rieder moved to approve.
$>$ Fashion Design 18FTDBS-18FTDFAS and Textile Design 18FTDBS-18FTDTEX - Approved Unanimously Discussion: Member Helmut Hergeth presented the Curricula revisions and explained the updates for each. Members complemented the visual displays illustrating the changes being made to the curricula. Member asked if having the amount of studio hours in the first year specifically for FTD 104 \& 105 is purposeful or cause for concern. Member answered that having a number of studio hours in the first year is a practice done within the college of design. Member confirmed and discussed the critical path for freshman students and the benefits of first year students having studio time. Member brought attention to the distribution of credit hours through semester display, the presenter explained fewer hours are planned for the senior year, in contrast to the freshman year, to allow time for any necessary additional coursework and study abroad opportunities.

Discussion: Member Shweta Trivedi presented the course. Member asked if an additional week should be added in the syllabus, specifically after Thanksgiving break. Members discussed the number of weeks generally being 17 weeks in the Fall semester based on breaks. Charles Clift from Registration and Records explained the minutes spent in class add to the appropriate course length by including the hours allocated for final examinations. Dr. Kirby further explained some courses may not meet again after Thanksgiving if students are given an assignment that the completion of which will require the remainder of the course.

Discussion: Member David Tarpy presented the course. Member asked if any additional safety concerns should be
addressed as a friendly suggestion and the Presenter agreed to discuss safety concerns with the instructor. Member brought attention to the syllabus where safety protocol is outlined. Member brought attention to the attendance policy in the syllabus, which indicates one absence is permitted. However; in contrast, the absences policy indicates with university approved excused absences students are permitted to make up missed work. Members requested clarification on the absence policy, indicating if the missed coursework can be made up only if an absence is excused, or if the student can make up the work for an unexcused absence. Member brought attention to a typo and made the friendly suggestion to fix in the syllabus.

## Concentration/Subplan Title: Literature

## Justification Statement:

The English Department underwent an External Review in the fall of 2014. The evaluation was conducted by distinguished faculty from our peer institutions at Florida State University, Rutgers, and Texas A\&M. The written report very candidly called for significant curricular change to our literature concentration:

A fundamental curricular revision (more than changing course titles) seems necessary at this point, with offerings tied to the specific interests and research projects of individual faculty, many of these interdisciplinary, rather than to the usual divisions of knowledge in literary studies: for example, period configurations or certain author clusters.

A literature faculty meeting was held in December of 2014. With faculty collectively agreeing with the assessment of the external reviewers, a formal literature retreat was organized on January 5 where faculty responded to four current models being used at peer institutions. These representative models were selected by the Literature Program Committee after considering requirements at 16 of our peer institutions. The retreat resulted in faculty submitting 11 new and different potential curricular models. Several surveys, additional Literature Program Committee meetings focused exclusively on curriculum, another literature faculty meeting, and two more ballots resulted in a new literature curriculum.

With unanimous consensus among our Literature Program Committee, a new literature concentration was unanimously approved by our department's Undergraduate Program Committee on March 1, 2016. These new requirements maintain the current core but create new categories and courses for the remaining hours. The new requirements emphasize skills over historical periodization. In addition, the new concentration amplifies the critical capital of the
faculty we have in the department who often specialize in interdisciplinary work that includes areas such as visual narrative and the digital humanities.

## Budget/Resources

As noted in the Justification statement above, this proposed revision to the concentration highlights the faculty resources we already have in the department. The course offerings provided in the Curriculum Requirements Format B, Plan SIS Code 16ENGLBA Subplan SIS Code 16ENGLLLT documentation (attached) will be taught exclusively at regular intervals by existing faculty in the Department of English.

## Anticipated Additional Resources Required

No additional resources are required.

## New Catalog Description

This curriculum provides a strong general education with an emphasis on the study of literature through interdisciplinary approaches. Attentive to the roles played by new media, diversity, and globalization, this concentration is also informed by the emerging field of digital humanities. It leads to a broad range of careers in education, business, government, law, etc. The major includes 39 hours of English courses beyond freshman composition, seven courses that satisfy categorical requirements, and two literature electives.

## Program Objectives

As with our current English major concentrations in Literature, Creative Writing, Film, Language Writing and Rhetoric, and Teacher Education, a degree in English literature provides
both liberal education and practical knowledge about the role of writing and language in the everyday world. It sharpens the analytical and interpretive skills needed for professional and managerial careers, and it serves as an excellent preparation for students planning to study law or medicine and for those intending to do graduate work in literature.

## ADA Changes to the English Core

As a result of these new changes, the ADA displays of all our English concentrations will need to be updated to reflect the current literature course offerings in "American Literature" and "British Literature" now listed in the "English Core" section of the submitted Format B. The changes in this Format B should be repeated identically on all other displays of the English Core for our concentrations. These changes affect our film, Language Writing and Rhetoric, Teacher Education, and Creative Writing displays.

## Course Catalog

In the process of making substantive revisions to the new literature concentration, seven courses are now longer needed in our course catalog.

Five (5) of these courses were formerly split by periodization and have now been combined. The resulting and newly combined courses create unity across the centuries they address. For example, the former courses ENG 370 Early Twentieth Century Fiction (1900-1945) and ENG 371 Late Twentieth Century Fiction (1945-2000) have been combined with a revised title: ENG 370 American Fiction, $20^{\text {th }}$ Century and Beyond. As a result, the former course ENG 371 is no longer needed in our catalog.

In addition to the type of changes listed above, ENG 475 Literature, the Arts, and Mass Culture is no longer needed in wake of the newly created ENG 340 Literature, Arts, and Society. We created a new number so it would fit in a sequence of courses to align with our Interdisciplinary Courses requirements.

ENG 497 is no longer needed as we have created four more relevant courses in our capstone category.

Last spring I made an effort to update the list of offerings available to students in the Arts Studies degree program with a foundation area in Theater. In that process, as recommended by the Director of University Theatre, John Mcllwee, I met with Mia Self, Assistant Director of University Theatre. Re: Curriculum Revision to the Aerospace Engineering Curriculum: 14AE
By means of this memorandum and the attached documents, the Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering Department proposes to modify its Aerospace Engineering (AE) curriculum. The revision replaces an engineering elective with a math elective (in response to feedback from the recent ABET review of the program in 2016), adds a new engineering GEP course, converts an open technical elective to a guided technical elective, and adds a computing pre-requisite to a junior-year course.

There is no change in the number of credit hours, which remains at 127. Addition of a Math elective requires students to choose a 3-credit course from a list of existing courses taught by the Math and Statistics programs. The list has been developed in consultation with the two programs; they have approved the addition of this Math elective. No new resources will be required for this change. A description of the program changes and the primary reasons for each change are listed below semester-by-semester. The current and proposed curricula as well as the new Format B are attached. Consultations are also included in the documents.

## Proposed Revisions with Reasons

Fall of the Freshman Year (Sem. 1):

- No changes


## Spring of the Freshman Year (Sem. 2):

- E 102 New Engineering GEP course (2 credit hours) added

The College of Engineering is introducing a new 2-credit GEP course in the second semester which they would like all Engineering programs to add to their curricula. This course will introduce students to the Engineering Grand Challenges.
This addition increases the total credit hours in this semester by 2 to 17 . To compensate for these 2 GEP credit hours, a 3 -credit GEP course in the $3^{\text {rd }}$ semester is removed and a 2 -credit GEP course in the $8^{\text {th }}$ semester is made into a 3 -credit GEP course.

Fall of the Sophomore Year (Sem. 3):

- Co-requisite added for MAE 251.

To allow for students to succeed in programming assignments in MAE 251, a computing corequisite is being added: CSC 113 or other programming courses (such as AP or college computer programming courses).
-3-credit GEP course removed.
This GEP course has been removed to make way for the E 102 GEP added in the $2^{\text {nd }}$ semester.
The removal of this GEP course brings the total credits for this semester from 18 to 15.

## Spring of the Sophomore Year (Sem. 4): <br> - No changes

## Fall of the Junior Year (Sem. 5): <br> - No changes

## Spring of the Junior Year (Sem. 6):

- A guided technical elective has been replaced with a Math elective

Following feedback from the 2016 ABET review of the program, a 3-credit Math elective is being added. The Math elective is to be selected from a list of courses offered by the Math and Statistics programs, or other courses to be approved on an individual basis. The Math courses MA 305 and MA 405 have been selected based on feedback from the Math department. The Statistics courses, ST 305, ST 312, ST 370, ST 371 and ST 372 have been selected based on feedback from Statistics.
To make way for this addition, a guided Materials/Electrical technical elective (MSE 201 or ECE 331 ) is being removed. Either of these two courses can be taken by students under the open technical electives in the $7^{\text {th }}$ and $8^{\text {th }}$ semesters.
MA and ST have been consulted and each provided written approval along with recommendations that have been taken into consideration (Attachment). MSE and ECE have also been consulted and each provided written approval (Attachment).

Fall of the Senior Year (Sem. 7):

- No changes


## Spring of the Senior Year (Sem. 8):

- A open technical elective is replaced with a Flight/Space technical elective

The AE faculty feel that students should complete both the courses in the Flight/Space elective: MAE 457 Flight Stability \& Control and the MAE 467 Intro to Space Flight. The flight course introduces students to the fundamentals of aircraft stability and control, while the space course introduced students to space flight. Based on current industry trends, both are essential for an aerospace engineer. However, it is desirable that the students be given the option to choose one of the two in the $6^{\text {th }}$ semester depending on whether they intend to opt for the aircraft or spacecraft senior design. In the $8^{\text {th }}$ semester they should complete the other course in this guided elective pair.
To make way for this Flight/Space technical elective, an open technical elective has been removed. Even after this change, students still have two open technical electives - one in the $7^{\text {th }}$ semester and another in the $8^{\text {th }}$ semester.

- A 2-credit GEP course is replaced with a 3-credit GEP course

This change keeps the total number of GEP credits in the curriculum unaltered.
These two changes increase the total credit hours in the $8^{\text {th }}$ semester from 14 to 15 . The total number of credits in the curriculum remains unaltered at 127 .

In response to the recent ABET review, the aerospace engineering (AE) program is proposing a minor revision to our undergraduate curriculum. This proposal has unanimous approval of the MAE faculty. The proposal impacts the MSE and ECE programs. We would appreciate it if you could take a look at the relevant revision and let us know by email of your approval or if you have any concerns.

Attached is the proposed revision. The relevant revision for your programs is item \# 1, discussed in page 3 of the document. We are replacing an MSE 201/ECE 331 elective in the 6 th semester with a Math elective. MSE 201 and ECE 331 will, instead, be added as choices under the open technical electives in the 7th and 8th semesters.

The AE cohort typically has 60 to 80 students. While it is possible that a few students will opt for these courses under their open technical electives, it is likely that this revision will result in a reduction in enrollment in these two courses.

We would like to send this proposal to the college curriculum committee this week to meet an ABET deadline. We would appreciate it if you could let us know if the proposal is ok with you. I'll be happy to call and provide any clarifications.

Hi Alina and Spencer,
In response to the recent ABET review, the aerospace engineering (AE) program is proposing a minor revision to our undergraduate curriculum. This proposal has unanimous approval of the MAE faculty. The proposal impacts the Math and Statistics programs. We would appreciate it if you could take a look at the relevant revision and let us know by email of your approval or if you have any concerns.

Attached is the proposed revision. The relevant revision for MA and ST is item \# 1, discussed in page 3 of the document. We are replacing a course (MSE 201/ECE 331 elective) in the 6 th semester with a Math elective. We propose providing 5 choices for satisfying this elective, which include: MA 305, MA 405, ST 361, and ST 370.

The AE cohort typically has 60 to 80 students. It is hard to say how many will opt for each of the 5 choices. Although this elective is listed in the proposed curriculum for the spring semester, it is likely that some students will complete this requirement in the fall or summer terms. Because these MA and ST courses are offered multiple times a year and often via multiple sections, we hope this will not result in any adverse impact on your programs.

We would like to send this proposal to the college curriculum committee this week to meet an ABET deadline. We would appreciate it if you could let us know if the proposal is ok with you. I'll be happy to call and provide any clarifications.

## Response from Spencer Muse (ST), 9 Jan:

Hi Ashok. I don't see any problem with this plan from the Statistics side (Unless all your students try to take 370!). I will point out that 361 is a very low-level ST course, one that uses no calculus. For your students, and for consistency with the other elective options in your list, I would suggest eliminating ST 361 from your options. If you would like another applied option, you could consider ST 305 or even 312-i bet many of your students have AP credit for its 311 prerequisite. Another thing to consider is that if your students were to pursue a ST minor, 370 is something of a dead end since it is designed as a terminal, stand-alone course. The entry options for the minor are a) ST 305, b) ST $311+312$, or c) ST $371+372$.
