WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

> Remarks from Chair Elect - Welcomed the committee members introduced guests.

- Remarks from OUCCAS/DASA- Li Marcus reminded the committee that we are in a scheduling period and encouraged communicating with their scheduling officers.
- Approval of the Minutes from September 12th 2018 <u>Approved Unanimously</u>
 - Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll moved to approve.

NEW BUSINESS

- Consent Agenda(ANS292,CSC Courses,PB405,11AGEVTS,14CPCTU,14CPM) -<u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Rudi Seracino moved to approve. No discussion
- \triangleright CSC 453 Introduction to Internet of Things (IoT) Systems - Approved Pending with Friendly Suggestion Discussion: Member Rudi Seracino presented the course action. Reviewer indicated the syllabus description and CIM don't match and the course length should be16-weeks. Motion to amend the motion from approved to approved pending adjusting the description in the syllabus and CIM to match. Member pointed out the grading method in CIM is letter grade only and part of pending motion. Friendly suggestions were made by members to correct the misspelling of calendar and to update the letter grading which currently has D twice and doesn't include D+. Member looked at the attendance policy and said the policy is the only thing referenced. Members discussed that attendance is not considered an element of the course as a 400 level course it doesn't have to require attendance. Member asked about the 'clean board policy' in the syllabus and asked why the students cannot write down what was written on the board. Members discussed that the syllabus points out that 'collaboration is different from collusion' and reached the conclusion that the statement is to prevent students from copying code from one another. Member pointed out the CIM field stated the course doesn't have additional fees but the course materials required are at the students' expense. Li Marcus confirmed the catalog description, CIM field, and Syllabus should all confirm that there are additional student fees for the course. Member asked guest Sarah Heckman if the required Lennox computer would be used for other courses, guest responded it wouldn't be required but could be used. Member asked if this is a specific fee is needed, Li Marcus said she will look into clarification for this.

> AFS 240 African Civilization- Approved Pending with Friendly Suggestion

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Li Marcus made the administrative comment that if there are no requisites for a course the initiator can leave the CIM field blank. Member asked about the attendance policy s "after 4 unexcused absences students will get an F" which contradicts the previous statement four absences would be equal to 0. Motion to amend the motion from approved to approved pending- motion approved. Member asked how "positive attitude" is measured in the portion of the final grade (10%) for participation. Members discussed that the requirement is for a student to be able to see how the full participation is met, member made friendly suggestion to clarify participation.

> PHI 330 Metaphysics- Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Member said this sounds like a fun class that they would be interested in taking and confirmed they did not find any issue with the course.

> PHI 331 Philosophy of Language- <u>Approved Unanimously</u>

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Reviewer complimented the course.

> PHI 333 Knowledge and Skepticism- Approved with Friendly Suggestion

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Chair read the reviewer comments from absent member discussing the student learning outcomes asking if the first is specific and if the third is measurable. For the first outcome, Jordan Luzader from the office of assessment indicated this is measurable, but is broad, presenter responded that this is purposeful due to the nature of the course. Members discussed if the third outcome is measureable, Jordan said the statement in question, "develop reasoning skills, becoming better" is extra, but doesn't make the outcome unmeasurable. Friendly suggestion to removed becoming better. Class participation was discussed by members, while it is not the most common standard it is acceptable. Member asked if the ISBN is required for required text books, Li Marcus brought up the policies page and confirmed the syllabus provides the required textbook information which does not include the ISBN.

> PHI 375 Ethics- <u>Approved with Friendly Suggestions</u>

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Member pointed out there is a discrepancy in the syllabus saying the final exam is 30% while in CIM it indicates 25%, friendly suggestion to match to 25%. Member brought attention to the red text in the syllabus indicating this could be an issue for colorblind individuals. Friendly suggestion to make all red text bolded (in schedule) to bring attention to the text for all students.

> PHI 376 History of Ethics- <u>Approved with Friendly Suggestions</u>

Discussion: Member Catherine Driscoll presented the course action. Reviewer commented that the second outcome saying "students will be able to reconstruct the arguments offered by the philosophers" would benefit from adjustments to the wording made the friendly suggestion to add some clarification for a measurement scale. Li Marcus clarified that because the GEP outcomes are the general course learning outcomes. Member pointed out the link on page 4 of the syllabus is broken and suggested correcting. Member commented that if just the form of assessment is using that outcome and indicated other courses have more vague assessment.

> Member commended the Philosophy department on the changes coming through as smoothly as they have.

PS 305 The Justice System in the American Political Process- <u>Approved with Friendly Suggestions</u>

Discussion: Member Scott Despain presented the course action. Member indicated that the syllabus and CIM have different people and asked, following up with the text comment from the other syllabus, if DELTA reviews what instructors have in CIM. Members commented that the catalog description in the syllabus and CIM are different and need to match verbatim in both, as this is what will be coded into SIS (MyPack) for students to read during enrollment. Members discussed that the syllabus can have the catalog description and an additional course description, this will not be coded into SIS. Members confirmed the catalog description in CIM and the syllabus now match. Member made the friendly suggestion on page nine, which indicates that the syllabus is a contract, member indicated the syllabus is not a contract and indicated the sentence should be a flexible document instead of a contract or that the syllabus should be flexible, removing the word contract.

> PS 335 International Law- Approved with Friendly Suggestion

Discussion: Member Scott Despain presented the course action. Member brought attention to the syllabus under course requirements the 10% participation portion, members discussed and concluded that students are able to see how they will earn full participation points but made the friendly suggestion for the instructor to clarify "attend regularly" and how many absences are acceptable.

> PS 345 Governments and Politics in the Middle East- <u>Approved with Friendly Suggestion</u>

Discussion: Member Scott Despain presented the course action. Member brought attention to the student learning outcome 3, "demonstrate an appreciation" and suggested adjusting to "describe the value" as appreciation is a difficult to measure. The office of assessment suggested the same for the first outcome as well, "a working familiarity" is difficult to measure, members agreed this should be a friendly suggestion.

Presenter commented that these 3 courses have been in the process for a long time (almost 2 years) and expressed joy that they are moving forward.

PS/WGS 418 Gender Law and Policies- <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Scott Despain presented the course action. Member asked if in the additional information section of CIM, members discussed that because these are in the syllabus this section of CIM is acceptable as it is.

REL 200 Introduction to the Study of Religion- <u>Approved Pending with Friendly Suggestions</u> Discussion: Member Scott Despain presented the course action. Member commented that in the general course student learning outcomes and on the third page of the syllabus there seem to be objectives for the course and suggested clarifying the syntax. Member commented the 10% attendance grade in the syllabus isn't in CIM making the CIM course total 90%. Member brought attention to the participation explanation in the syllabus. Motion to amend the potion to approved pending the clarification of the percentage of participation, and participation within an assignment in the syllabus. Member made the friendly suggestion to clarify if assignments that are 'a day late' would mean a weekday or if the weekend of holidays would also count against the student.

> BBS/FS 325 Introduction to Brewing Science and Technology- Approved with Friendly Suggestions

Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the course action. Member suggested changing the first student learning outcome to change demonstrate to describe. Member suggested including a statement on the topic schedule indicating the schedule is subject to change. Member suggested fixing the broken student conduct link in the syllabus.

HS 491 Sustainable Agriculture Entrepreneurship Study Abroad-<u>Tabled with Friendly Suggestions with one</u> <u>apposed vote</u>

Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill Presented the course action. Chair read the comments from absent reviewers indicating the syllabus and CIM have conflicting information about students being able to repeat the course for credit. Member suggested adjusting the first outcome in the syllabus and then copying the new version into CIM for consistency. Member brought attention to the student eval methods in CIM and suggested limiting the details in CIM to encompass all offerings of this course without needing to update all information in CIM. Member suggested adding letter grade, statement indicating the schedule is subject to change. Motion to amend motion to approved pending clarification of the repeatability in CIM. Member brought attention to the contact/credit hours in CIM. Member discussed the component type indicated and discussed that lecture is not an accurate reflection of the study abroad trip, there seems to be some field work or labs included toward the contact/credit hours. Li Marcus provided an explanation of what generally calculates for contact/credit hours and reminded the committee OUCCAS is available to assist. Pending: Repeatability clarification, adjusting the first student learning outcome in CIM to be measurable. Credit/Contact hours need to calculate correctly.

FS: Member brought attention to the link in the safety and risk assumption in page 5 in the syllabus. Member suggested clarifying the evaluation. Member discussed there could be a rigorous assessment that allows for assessment while abroad. Member made the friendly suggestion to correct the spelling of some of the locations on page four Telotitan (teotitan) and Tlacochachuaya (Tlacochuaya) in the syllabus. Add a rounding statement to your grading scale & add a "subject to change with sufficient notice" or similar to your course schedule (in case something happens and the schedule needs to change)

Members discussed amending the motion form approved pending to **tabled**. Motion approved, four apposed, 11 approved as tabled wanted to see information regarding Contact/Credit hours and component type as well as the activities students will participate in while abroad. Repeatability clarification, adjusting the first student learning outcome in CIM to be measurable.

- PB 277 Space Biology <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the course action. Member complimented the course and asked what is changing in the description, Li Marcus clarified the description is adding an oxford comma.
- BS Agricultural and Environmental Technology: Agricultural Systems Management (11AGEVTBS-11AGEVTASM)- <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action.
- BS Plant and Soil Sciences- Crop Biotechneology (11PSSBS-11PSSPCB)- <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action. Complimented the clarity of this and the Turfgrass Science curricular action.
- BS Plant and Soil Sciences- Crop Production (11PSSBS-11PSSPAC)- <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action.
- BS Plant and Soil Sciences-Soil Science (11PSSBS-11PSSSST)- <u>Approved Unanimously with Friendly Suggestion</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action. Member commented that the footnotes on the pages have not been updated because E in the GEP requirements is no longer Physical Education.
- BS Natural Resources- Soil and Water Systems(11NATRLBS-11NATRLNRW)- <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action.
- BS Turfgrass Science (11TFGBS) <u>Approved Unanimously</u> Discussion: Member Melissa Merrill presented the curricula action.

Justification

Update description of the minor: These changes to the minor description reflect the change from the Multidisciplinary Studies program to the Interdisciplinary Studies program. Another change is to go from the old "LFM" English curricular prefix Legacy code to the current "FLM" prefix SIS code. The last change reflects a change in a degree name from "Arts Application (LRT-F)" major to "Arts Studies (16ARTSTFLM)."

Remove ENG 359 and ENG/FLM 459: The courses were planned as part of the development of the FLM curriculum but were never developed or taught.

Remove "FLM" cross-list from ENG 378: The FLM curriculum designation is not in effect

Remove graduate classes from the minor: The film faculty determined that it would be inappropriate to have graduate level classes available for an undergraduate minor and would instead prefer to focus enrollment in their undergraduate offerings. There are enough undergraduate film courses and seats to accommodate both majors and minors.

Add ENG 492 "Special Topics in Films Styles and Genres": This is a relatively new course that the film faculty believes should be included in the minor.

Change COM 344 to COM 444: This change merely reflects a change in course numbering.

1. Justification

Jewish Studies at NC State is an interdisciplinary academic initiative promoting engagement with the history, culture, and religious traditions of the Jewish people in the past and the present. Jewish Studies sponsors campus lectures and events, serves as an academic resource for students, and supports faculty and graduate student research through its leadership in the NC Jewish Studies Seminar and the NC Jewish Studies Consortium.

Currently, students interested in pursuing a degree in Jewish Studies can do so through collaboration with the Interdisciplinary Studies Self-Design Major. At its last meeting (Spring 2018), the Jewish Studies Academic Steering Committee voted unanimously in favor of the creation of an inter-departmental minor in Jewish Studies. With the recent addition of new faculty and undergraduate courses in Jewish Studies and related disciplines, the resources are available to extend this additional option to students at the university.

2. Academic Minor Program Objectives

The chief objective of the minor is to enable undergraduate students at the university to pursue study of the history, culture, and religious traditions of the Jewish people. Because the minor will encompass several fields of study, it will also allow students to pursue their work using various disciplinary perspectives, among them religious, historical, sociological, and literary.

EN / FL 246: Literature of the Holocaust

The course will study selected works from different genres and media – memoir, novel, graphic memoir, film, survivor videos, poetry – all portraying various aspects of the Holocaust and its aftermath. Such themes as survival, dehumanization, guilt, and retribution will be discussed, as well as Nazi ideology and politics. Recent readings have included Appelfeld, *Badenheim 1939*, Wiesel, *Night*, Spiegelman, *MAUS*, Levi, *If This Is A Man*, Schlink *The Reader*, and Bruck, *Who Loves You Like This...*

HI 307: Jewish History

This course is a survey of major topics in Jewish history, including the development of Jewish life on the European continent, patterns of migration that created a global diaspora, as well as the formation of the modern State of Israel.

HI 418: Fascist Italy and Nazi Germany

Fascism as a theoretical concept, rise of fascism in Italy and Germany, seizure of power by Mussolini and Hitler, organization of the economy, churches, military, women, youth, and culture under the dictatorships.

HI 466: History of Palestine-Israel Conflict

Historical roots and development of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict from the late nineteenth century until the present through the study of the history and historiography of Zionism, Palestinian nationalism, creation of the state of Israel, establishment of settlements, conflicts and peace negotiations, as well as a study of the impact of this conflict on both Israeli and Palestinian societies, economies and cultures.

REL 311: Introduction to Hebrew Bible

Study of Old Testament books, examining their content, background, and development. Comparisons of the biblical material with other Ancient Near Eastern Literature. Assessment of contributions from archaeology and literary studies to clarify the text.

REL 314: Inter-Testamental Literature

An introduction to the literature of Second Temple Judaism, in the context of Jewish history, institutions and beliefs of the Intertestamental Period (ca. 300 B.C.-ca. 100 A.D.).

REL 350: Introduction to Judaism

A survey of Jewish religious traditions from the bible through the present day. Evolution of major religious ideas through classical texts including torah, Talmud, philosophical and mystical literature, and contemporary fiction.

- Special Topics courses, when topically appropriate, may be approved for the minor. Previous examples include ENG 492/IDS 496 Special Topics in Film Styles and Genres, *ST title: Representing the Holocaust*, and FLG 390 German Special Topics, *ST title: German Film and the Holocaust*.
- There are plans to divide HI 307 (Jewish History) into two courses, one on early modern and modern Judaism, and the other on the biblical and medieval periods.
- The Department of Foreign Languages and Literature is also arranging to offer modern Hebrew through the Language Exchange. Once this plan is fully implemented, we will decide how modern Hebrew and other relevant languages (for example, Arabic and Yiddish) can be counted for completion of the Jewish Studies minor.

4. Catalog Description of Proposed Minor

The undergraduate minor in Jewish studies treats the history, religious traditions, culture, language, and literature of the Jewish people. Students in this interdisciplinary program will have the opportunity to deepen their understanding and appreciation of Judaism from a wide range of academic disciplines, including Religious Studies, History, Language, Literature, and Film Studies.

• Admission

Students interested in declaring a Jewish Studies minor should contact the coordinator of the Jewish Studies minor by their junior year or earlier, if possible. In order to be enrolled officially in the Jewish Studies minor and have this displayed in the student's degree audit, students should complete and submit the <u>Declare a Minor</u> form to Registration and Records.

• Completion

Completion of a minor in Jewish Studies requires at least 15 hours of course work in approved courses. No more than 6 hours of transfer credit may be used toward the minor.

Required Courses

The division will determine whether courses which have been transferred from other institutions qualify for the minor. No more than two courses from other institutions may count toward the minor. Students must complete any five of the following courses:

Students must have an overall 2.0 GPA in the minor. A maximum of ONE (1) course may be double-counted towards both major departmental requirements and minor electives. Application for the Minor Certification form for Jewish Studies must be approved and signed by the coordinator, and then delivered to the IDS Main Office (1911-106), usually no later than the term when the requirements for the minor are met.

7. Other Departments Likely to be Affected and Summary of Consultations with those Departments

Jewish Studies is administered by the Interdisciplinary Studies Program at NC State. Course offerings are drawn from several departments, including English, History, Foreign Languages and Literatures, and Philosophy and Religious Studies. The Steering Committeee of Jewish Studies, which includes faculty from the relevant disciplines, voted unaminously in favor of the minor. We have also contacted the heads of the four affected departments. They have all responded favorably to the proposal to create a minor in Jewish Studies.

Jewish Studies (16JSTM proposed)

Description

The undergraduate minor in Jewish studies treats the history, religious traditions, culture, language, and literature of the Jewish people. Undergraduate Certificate in the Essentials of Business-Attachments

Statement of Justification: When new graduates enter the workforce, they quickly realize the importance of understanding how a business works and how people interact to help the business be successful. Such understanding also helps them advance within a company.

It currently can be difficult for a non-PCOM student to gain this knowledge while an undergraduate, largely due to semesters which already are consumed addressing the student's core program. Another hurdle is the fact that desired business classes often are not available to non-business students during the fall and spring semesters. We recognize challenges with course availability during the regular academic year thus the creation of this new certificate program as a summer only program. We are designing the program for maximum flexibility and to allow us to provide as much access to students as possible

This Certificate addresses both needs, by providing a 4-course core set of topics, delivered:

- 1. During the Summer (no conflict with a student's core program),
- 2. In an on-line format (allows work around summer jobs or other conflicts)

During the Spring 2018 Semester, about 88% of NC State's undergraduate population was in a College other than Business¹. This population is the target audience.

Statement of Program Objectives: Students who earn the Certificate will:

- 1. Be able to identify the primary business functions, including the attributes which make each function important.
- 2. Gain practice in the ways which business processes operate, and be able identify strengths and weaknesses of a process within a Company.
- 3. Show proficiency in two core areas:
 - a. Business Essentials (placeholder number = BUS295)
 - b. Introduction to Financial and Managerial Accounting (ACC280)
- 4. Gain additional proficiency in two selected topics. Choices include:
 - a. HR (MIE330)
 - b. Marketing (BUS360)
 - c. Operations Management (BUS370)
 - d. Personal Finance (BUS225)
 - e. Individual Income Tax (ACC230)

Statement of Proposed Revision with Reasons: Not applicable-new Program.

¹According to the Office of Institutional Research and Planning, there were 23,332 undergraduate students in the Spring 2018 semester, with 2865 in the Poole College of Management.

Statement of Program Requirements:

- 1. Four courses of 3 semester hours:
 - a. Requirement One: Two required core courses:
 - i. BUS 280 Business Essentials
 - ii. ACC280: Introduction to Financial and Managerial Accounting
 - b. Requirement Two: Two elective courses selected from this list:
 - i. MIE330: Human Resource Management
 - ii. BUS360: Marketing Methods
 - iii. BUS370: Operations Management
 - iv. BUS225: Personal Finance
 - v. ACC230: Uses of Accounting Information
- 2. There are no other required examinations, presentations, or external learning experiences.
- 3. A total of 12 semester hours is required.
- 4. Satisfactory completion of the certificate program requires:
 - a. completion of the coursework noted above
 - b. a grade of D- or better in all courses used to satisfy the certificate requirements
 - c. an overall GPA of 2.0 or better for all courses used to satisfy the certificate requirements

Description: This Certificate is designed for the non-business undergraduate student who realizes that an understanding of business is essential for success in the workplace. It recognizes that the student's regular academic program often does not accommodate additional courses during the Fall or Spring semesters.

There are two required 3 unit courses covering business essentials and financial/managerial accounting. The student then selects two 3 unit courses from the following:

Human Resource Management Marketing Methods Operations Management Personal Finance Uses of Accounting Information

Courses are offered in an online format during Summer sessions. This is to avoid conflict with a possible summer job or other activities.

Number of Certificate recipients in the past five years: None-new Program

Projected Enrollment: 400 students over a five-year period

<u>Admissions Requirements</u>: A student must have a minimum of a 2.0 grade point average to be accepted into this program. The application deadline is 60 days prior to the date of the first course the student wishes to take.
