 - o Discussion: Member moved to approve.

OLD BUSINESS

ECE 384 Practical Engineering Prototyping- Approved Pending

Discussion: Member Kanton Reynolds presented the course action. Member indicated the number of weeks needs to be updated to be in sync with the syllabus. Member also indicated the information in the requisites should be moved to the description as they are not codable. Presenter amended the motion to approve pending the correction to the number of weeks and moving the non-code-able requisites to the catalog description. Updating the contact hours to 5 to equal 3 credit hours.

> SLC 401 Independent Study in Leadership Theory Application- Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the course action. Member indicated there was no consultation with CALS. Member indicated that since the course had no pre-requisites it eliminates the courses on the list. Members asked if there is truly overlap if students outside of CALS are unable to enroll. Members decided it is not overlapping. Member indicated there is a way the instructor can waive the pre-requisite requirement for students.

NEW BUSINESS

Consent Agenda - Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member moved to approve.

MUS 104 Theory and Musicianship Lab I - Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the course action. Member asked if the fee for the course needs to be in the CIM record. Li explained that will be removed from the CIM record, so if it is in the syllabus it doesn't need to be in the CIM record. The point wishing to be highlighted is that students should be made aware so it should be in the syllabus.

Members discussed if there needs to be "will" or "may" because there are events on campus that are free, but they can go to other events up to \$20.

Member confirmed the objectives and outcomes are different, Li indicated course objectives are required. Member brought attention to the requisites section indicating MUS 103 should be taken prior or at the same time. Members looked back at the MUS 103 and 104 records have the same statement for co-requisites. Guest Tom Koch indicated 104 is a lab for 103. They cannot take MUS 104 before taking 103. Member brought attention to the additional comments stating that the co-requisites can drop 103 while taking 104, but 104 will be dropped along with 103. Members determined this is codable.

MUS 153 Theory and Musicianship II - Approved Pending

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the course action. Member asked in the syllabus there is a textbook listed by name and that it is available as a PDF in Moodle. Professor indicated the textbook is online and the publisher has been suing universities for providing the full text online. Guest and member discussed if this should be pending making sure this is a free resource.

Libraries offered to put the instructor in touch with legal to provide information.

Motion to amend the motion from approved to approve pending confirmation that the text online is legal. Members included speaking with Kyle from R&R for appropriate coding of the co-requisites as part of a pending motion XONV member asked why the numbers indicated a shift, guest confirmed. Member indicated these should disappear in the future because that is how they indicate ag institute courses.

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the new course action. Member indicated the prefix and number on the syllabus should match the CIM record. Member asked how homework is sent in via email, if the students are required to do homework via pencil how do they get it turned in. Guest indicated generally this Make up test policy how this would need to be taken within 48 hours, member asked if this should be more flexible. Members indicated because it says "unless otherwise warranted" this is fine. Suggestion to match syllabus and course number by adding 203a. Motion to amend motion to pending speaking with Kyle from R&R for appropriate coding of the co-requisites as part of a pending motion.

MUS 204a Theory and Musicianship III - Approved Pending with Suggestion

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the new course action pending speaking with Kyle from R&R for appropriate coding of the co-requisites as part of a pending motion. Member indicated this also doesn't have an 'a' indication on the syllabus. Li explained at this is a system issue and the members agreed this works for now.

MUS 253 Theory and Musicianship IV- Approved Pending with Suggestion.

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the new course action pending speaking with Kyle from R&R for appropriate coding of the co-requisites as part of a pending motion.

Member asked if this is for a curricula, guest responded this will if the Music curricula passes.

Member asked if this needs an electronically hosted statement, if there is no online requirement, this is not needed. Suggestion to remove the statement if not required.

MUS 254 Theory and Musicianship Lab IV - Approved Pending

Discussion: Member Peggy Domingue presented the new course action pending speaking with Kyle from R&R for appropriate coding of the co-requisites.

- Member brought up that there should be a consultation with CHASS before the motion moves forward. This would be a tabled action. Members asked for some examples of the overlap. Examples were provided by the college of Humanities and Social Sciences. Guest indicated the ARS 306 course is actually UC's course. Guest Rodney Waschka indicated he teaches some of these courses and did not receive any consultation. Motion to table the rest of the courses. Li explained procedurally they would combine the actions before tabling.

Guest Daniel Monek asked for more specific guidance as to why certain courses are needing to be consulted. Member explained because there are existing courses they are concerned about overlap. Guest Tom Koch asked if there is a way to look at the syllabi to see if there is overlap. Member indicated the consultation still needs to happen. Members and guests discussed timelines and how this will impact when students can enroll in courses.

Bret indicated the degree proposal was approved by the deans and associate deans from the letter of intent. Members discussed that the degree goes to the associate deans for comment.

Chair indicated that since each of the courses are approved pending.

Guest asked if a course is crosslisted, should both departments be crosslisted.

Guest asked is there consideration for a degree program that is the same as another.

Guest indicated there are MUS courses that are elective options for Arts Studies CHASS programs.

Member indicated that there is a miscount of the number of house in the a Format B being 98 hours, not 120, including in pending.

➤ ET 460 Practice of Environmental Technology- Approved Pending

Discussion: Member Joseph Roise presented the course action. Update to the DRO statement and indication of field trips should be brought to students' attention earlier. Member indicated fieldtrips are mentioned. Member motioned to amend the motion from approved to approve pending.

FOR 353 GIS and Remote Sensing for Environmental Analysis and Assessment- Approved Pending with Suggestion

Discussion: Member Joseph Roise presented the course action. Member indicated the DRO needs to be updated, the credit hours are needed on the syllabus, and no electronic hosting statement. Member motioned to amend the motion from approved to approve pending.

Under Credit only- the syllabus indicates this is 80%, however the university policy is a C- or higher.

Pre-requisites are not codable, change to junior and seniors and indicate in the catalog description should include In the first outcome "Demonstrate an understanding..." what would constitute understanding, exchanging for "identify" "apply" or "define" provides more structure.

Member asked if students are required to have a computer microphone or if these kinds of technology requirements are available in the library. Presenter indicated that there is a computing lab that these students will have access to and added this as a suggestion.

> CSC 216 Software Development Fundamentals- Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member Kanton Reynolds presented the course action. Page 4 indicates recordings cannot be done without instructor's permission. Members discussed that NC law indicates that if the people in the class know that there is a recording, there is protection.

In Regulation 02.20.11 there is explicit language about recording in the classroom. In this context, the committee decided this is acceptable.

> CSC 217 Software Development Fundamentals Lab- Approved Pending

Discussion: Member Kanton Reynolds presented the course action. Member asked if CSC 216 should be a corequisite. The instructor indicated students who needed to drop or repeat one of the courses. Members suggested setting up the course as a co-requisite so that if a student drops one but not the other they can remain in the course. Motion to amend the motion form approved to approved pending the introduction of CSC 216 as a co-requisites.

ISE 413/(513) Humanitarian Logistics- Approved Pending

TOX 201 Poisons, People and the Environment- Approved Unanimously

Discussion: Member Spencer Muse presented the course action.

Discussion: Outcome of 493 special topics discussion. Rudi brought up that we are interested in Special Topics subcommittee with a time line would be in the Spring to bring a suggestion to committee then the provost. The charge of this committee would be to look at past best practices and have boundaries. Or there could be CIM fields that could have different information for special topics.

Li indicated if you haven't served on a subcommittee before. OUCCAS will assist with any information gathering and such.

College of Humanities and Social Sciences Consultation: MUT courses December 12, 2019

MUT 303 Introduction to Audio Technology I

Summary: Although minimal amounts of information are provided regarding course topics, making identification of the exact amount of overlap a bit challenging, there are clear points of overlap between this course and courses offered in our college.

Consultation from Department of Communication: With regards to overlap with COM 307 - Digital Audio Production and COM 407 - Advanced Digital Audio, our primary concern is not actually about overlap of specific topics in the course. While the titles of the two COM and two MUT courses lead one to expect much overlap, in reality there is little overlap in content. Our courses cover material regarding communication technologies used for the capture & editing of digital audio. The MUT courses do not cover digital audio technology broadly; they have a clear focus on audio technology as it used in working with music.

Recommendation: Our faculty with expertise in this area strongly suggest that MUT 303 be retitled to indicate a focus on "Recording & Mixing Music," as opposed to the general "audio technologies" that our faculty believe are well covered within our current offerings of COM 307 & 407. As they stand, the titles are so general that they appear to overlap with audio production courses more than in actuality. If this course were retitled to reflect the music-centered nature present in the content, presumed overlap with our COM offerings is diminished and the COM faculty would have no other strong objections at this time.

Consultation with Art Studies: This course does have actual content overlap with ARS/MUS 306 - Music Composition with Computers. Additive and subtractive synthesis techniques are covered in both the MUT course and the ARS/MUS course. Physical modeling is also a potential area of overlap but it is discussed as an elective topic in the ARS/MUS course – if the students have an interest, the faculty member addresses it in the course. It is unclear what the MUT learning outcome #4 means, that states: "Create a technological artifact for audio processing." If this means students are required to engage in composition of a piece of music, then this outcomes does overlap with the outcome ARS/MUS 306 VPA outcome #3.

Aside from the overlap question, one other question from ARS is "Why is MA 241 as a prerequisite?" It seems unnecessary and unjustified by the demands of the course as indicated in the syllabus; clarification would be helpful (at minimum, for students and advisors).

MUT 304 Introduction to Audio Technology II

Summary: Although minimal amounts of information are provided regarding course topics, making identification of the exact amount of overlap a bit challenging, there are clear points of overlap between this course and courses offered in our college.

Consultation from Department of Communication: [Note: these are the same comments are for MUT 303]. With regards to overlap with COM 307 - Digital Audio Production and COM 407 - Advanced Digital Audio, our primary concern is not actually about overlap of specific topics in the course. While the titles of the two COM and two MUT courses lead one to expect much overlap, in reality there is little overlap in content. Our courses cover material regarding communication technologies used for the capture & editing of digital audio. The MUT courses do not cover digital audio technology broadly; they have a clear focus on audio technology as it used in working with music.

Recommendation: Our faculty with expertise in this area strongly suggest that MUT 304 be retitled to indicate a focus on "Recording & Mixing Music," as opposed to the general "audio technologies" that our faculty believe are well covered within our current offerings of COM 307 & 407. As they stand, the titles are so general that they appear to overlap with audio production courses more than in actuality. If this course were retitled to reflect the music-centered nature present in the content, presumed overlap with our COM offerings is diminished and the COM faculty would have no other strong objections at this time.

Consultation with Art Studies: Minimal amounts of information provided. Some coverage of digital effects and digital audio workstations takes place in ARS/MUS 306.

MUT 315 Music Perception and Cognition

Summary: There are sigificant points of overlap between this course and courses offered in our college.

Consultation from Art Studies: One of the learning outcomes (student learning outcome #4) is to "Plan and execute a scientific listening experiment." There is no indication in the syllabus and evaluation methods that this will be implemented. If it is, clarification might be helpful in terms of instruction on the use of human participants in course assignments (e.g., IRB).

Consultation from the Department of Psychology: The course MUT 315 Music Perception and Cognition shows substantial overlap with existing courses in psychology - namely PSY 400 Perception, PSY 420 Cognitive Psychology, and PSY 430 Biological Psychology - as well as teaching discipline-specific, psychology content. There is enough overlap that the Department of Psychology believes this would duplicate already existing courses. Hence, we are not in favor of this proposed course.

The course title incorporates "Cognition", which is a discipline-specific term in Psychology. The catalog description, as well, is rather typical for an auditory perception class, as they are taught in Psychology. Our PSY 400 Perception class is more general but includes auditory perception and music perception. Auditory perception also appears in PSY 420 Cognitive Psychology and the anatomy of the auditory system, as well as the neuropsychological processing of auditory signals, is part of PSY 430 Biological Psychology.

Finally, the proposed textbook, which seems to be all the readings that are given, for MUT 315: "An Introduction to the Psychology of Hearing" has not only the term "Psychology" in its title, which should be enough to indicate that the content is Psychology, but the author Brian Moore is also Emeritus Professor of Psychology at the University of Cambridge, UK, which indicates that the expertise stems from Psychology. The table of contents (The nature of sound and the structure and function of the auditory system; Absolute thresholds; Frequency selectivity, masking and the critical band; The perception of loudness; Temporal processing in the auditory system; Pitch perception; Space perception; Auditory pattern and object perception; Speech perception; Practical applications) is typical for an auditory perception class and has - interestingly - not the word music in its chapters.

Therefore, we are not only opposing the course because of apparent overlap to courses in Psychology (PSY 400 Perception, PSY 420 Cognitive Psychology, PSY 430 Biological Psychology), but we also oppose the course because it tries to offer Psychology content as a music class. With rare exceptions, similar courses are housed in Psychology. We were actually stunned by how little music-related content is proposed for this course.

Recommendation: Work with the Department of Psychology to assess which courses might be available as potential electives in this degree program that can achieve the same learning outcomes without the creation of a new course.

MUT 403 Music Recording and Mixing

Consultation with Art Studies: There is no mention of some logistics that seem to need explanation given the outcomes of the course. For example, where will the music recordings take place and what equipment (hardware and software) will be used? (NCSU has no dedicated recording spaces or acoustically interesting halls.) Will students learn on a single platform or multiple platforms? Will students be required to work with multiple, different genres? If not, which genres? Why those and not others? These details would likely be important for students to understand.

MUT 431 Music Technology 1

Consultation with Art Studies: Given that a violin and a snare drumstick are both pieces of music technology as are hardware such as electronic keyboards, the title of this course seems overly broad for what is actually covered. The course seems to be an "Introduction to the **software-based** [my emphasis] analysis of digital music signals; " covering topics such as beat

tracking, pitch tracking, audio feature extraction and genre classification along with music information retrieval (which could overlap with library science). There is minimal overlap with ARS 257 (Technology in the Arts) because this course takes a broader view and provides some historical and analytical context.

Recommendation: Consider revising the title of the course to better and more specifically match the content and learning outcomes (helping distinguish this course from other MUT courses). Also, consider the alignment of the final project with the outcomes of the course; a paper and presentation seems broad and potentially mismatched.

MUT 432 Music Technology II

Consultation with Art Studies: Again, the title is not descriptive of actual course content. The course seems to contain a review of certain aspects of digital audio signal processing and then the real core of the course is "music analysis problems of modeling and synthesis". So, a course title such as, "Analysis of Digital Signal Modeling and Synthesis" or "Analysis of Digital Audio Modeling and Synthesis" or "Analysis of Digital Modeling and Synthesis" or "Digital Audio Analysis" would be more appropriate.

Recommendation: Consider revising the title of the course to better and more specifically match the content and learning outcomes.

MUT 461 Music Technology Senior Project I MUT 462 Music Technology Senior Project II

Consultation with Art Studies: Students completing a senior project would benefit from taking ARS/MUS 306 prior to taking these courses, given the prior experience of Dr. Rodney Waschka as an instructor of similar projects in a computer science course (on which these courses are based).

Recommendation: Include ARS/MUS 306 as an elective in this degree program (see Appendix for a fuller explanation).

Re: Pending Items for MUT course proposals

The Department of Music is grateful for the consult provided by the College of Humanities and Social Sciences for its proposed MUT courses that are a part of the Request to Establish a new major in Music Technology. Our work on these courses was based on external consulting with music engineering and technology colleagues at other institutions that offer similar majors. Additionally we attempted to be mindful of the fact that they will likely be heavily influenced by the two new faculty hires in music engineering/technology that will follow the approval of the Request to Establish. Accordingly, the department has provided comments and made adjustments, detailed below and altered in CIM, to increase the clarity of our intent and address some of the concerns raised by the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. We have also made note of other suggestions that may impact future decision making as a result of pending faculty hires. Excerpts from the consultation appear below in bold.

- 1. MUT 303 (Introduction to Audio Technology I)
- "...suggest that MUT 303 be retitled to indicate a focus on 'Recording & Mixing Music" as opposed to general "audio technologies" that our faculty believe are well covered within...COM 307 & 407." p.1

While this course does introduce students to the use and application of a variety of analog audio technologies in use in the music industry, its primary purpose within the context of our proposed degree program (and the fundamental difference from COM 307 & 407 as this course does not address issues of "...production, including studio operation, performing, writing and producing" as noted in the course description for COM 307) is to introduce students to the design and engineering fundamentals and core concepts that support the current analog technology in use in the music industry. It is this critical understanding of current audio technology provided in MUT 303 & 304 that provides the foundation for the project work imbedded throughout the curriculum that culminates in the planning, designing, and completion of a product design project in a student's senior year. While nomenclature continues to evolve within the emerging discipline of music engineering/technology, we believe the current title is reflective of current practice and that the descriptions and prerequisites of all of the courses aid in distinguishing them from the COM courses.

- 2. MUT 304 (Introduction to Audio Technology II)
- "...suggest that MUT 304 be retitled to indicate a focus on 'Recording & Mixing Music" as opposed to general "audio technologies" that our faculty believe are well covered within...COM 307 & 407." p.2

While this course does introduce students to the use and application of a variety of digital audio technologies in use in the music industry, its primary purpose within the context of our proposed degree program (and the fundamental difference from COM 307 & 407 as this course does not address issues of "...production, including studio operation, performing, writing and producing" a noted in the course description for COM 307) is to introduce students to the design and engineering fundamentals and core concepts that support the current digital technology in use in the music industry. It is this critical understanding of current audio technology provided in MUT 303 & 304 that provides the foundation for the project work imbedded throughout the curriculum that culminates in the planning, designing, and completion of a product design project in a student's senior year. While nomenclature continues to evolve within the emerging discipline of music engineering/technology, we believe the current title is reflective of current practice and that the descriptions and prerequisites of all of the courses aid in distinguishing them from the COM courses.

3. MUT 315 (Music Perception & Cognition)

"The course...shows substantial overlap with existing courses in psychology – namely PSY 400 Perception, PSY 420 Cognitive Psychology, and PSY 430 Biological Psychology – as well as teaching discipline specific, psychology content." p. 2

"...we also oppose the course because it tries to offer Psychology content as a music class." p. 3

The Department of Music concurs that the information provided in this course proposal unintentionally describes a course that appears to substantially overlap existing courses in Psychology and misrepresents our intent for a course recommended by outside consultants to address basic concepts of acoustics and psychoacoustics in the context of the work of music technologists. We have amended the course title, description, and syllabus to better reflect our intent for this portion of the curriculum and shared these changes with the Department of Psychology.

SUBJECT: Adjustment to WGS curricula

This memo requests a minor action change to replace the required course WGS 300 with a required choice between two courses: students must take *either* WGS 300 *or* WGS 380 (cross-listed with AFS 380). If a student elects to take *both* WGS 300 and WGS 380, one may count as a Concentration Area Elective.

Interdisciplinary Studies - Women's and Gender Studies Concentration, 16IDSBA_16IDSWGS Line 2-20 on degree audit, Feminist Theories requirement

Women's and Gender Studies Minor, 16WGM Line 1-20 on degree audit, Feminist Theories requirement

Justification:

Providing students with an option for how they fulfill their feminist theory requirement eases scheduling pressure on WGS 300, which is offered only once per year, thus making it easier for students to fulfill their requirements in a timely manner. The addition of WGS 380 also responds to increased student demand for variety in the content of what is taught about feminist theory.

Impact on current students:

Current students in the Women's and Gender Studies Concentration or the Women's and Gender Studies Minor will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old plan.

<u>Proposed Revision</u>: This is to request that the following course be added to the Portuguese Studies Minor (16PORTM)

FLP401- Brazilian Portuguese for Spanish Speakers

Justification:

When the 16PORTM was set up, I did not include FLP401 as an admissible elective towards the minor because I thought that students would be able to supplement our NCSU offerings through regular on-line/video conference courses offered by the Portuguese Consortium of the UNC Language Assembly. Unfortunately, this possibility has proven to be rare owing to the often last-minute cancellation of the UNC Online courses due to low enrollments. In order to help our students complete the minor, I added an FL295 course in advanced Portuguese grammar (as I am doing this semester). While the addition of FLP401 would not aid all our intended minors, it would be another NCSU possibility in achieving the minor.

Resulting Requirements: With the addition of FLP401, the text would read:

In addition to FLP 201 (3 credits), two additional Portuguese language or culture courses (6 credits) above the FLP 201 level are required. Students may take FLP401--Brazilian Portuguese for Spanish Speakers and/or one or two courses to be listed under the NCSU FL295 rubric or taken through the UNC Language Assembly/Portuguese as a World Language Consortium.

Subject: Development of new Agricultural Entrepreneurship Minor

1. Statement of Justification

A technological revolution is occurring in agriculture with rapid changes in multiple technologies including gene editing, GPS indexed monitoring and automated controls, massive data collection, artificial intelligence, machine learning, predictive analytics, robotics, microbiome management, and wearable monitors for plants and animals. Entrepreneurship is in great demand as people in all types of businesses and institutions race to implement new technologies and flourish in new markets. Students, parents, employers, alumni and stakeholders of CALS demand educational programs to empower graduates to participate in the new entrepreneurial era of global agribusiness; and find solutions big and small to address grand challenges in food and hunger, fiber, renewables, ecosystem, and environmental enhancement, and resource conservation.

The minor will support important public and private research innovation initiatives of CALS such as the Plant Sciences Initiative, the Food Manufacturing Initiative, and the Food Animal Initiative. Additionally, the minor empowers rural economic development through educating future business builders and leaders in those communities.

Current enrollment in the three required minor courses stands at 65 with increased enrollment anticipated following the establishment of the minor.

4. Catalog Description of Proposed Minor

The Minor in Agricultural Entrepreneurship is available to undergraduates in all majors. Courses in the minor cover the basic mindset, principles, and practices of entrepreneurship, including how to start a new business and how to add value to an existing business. Entrepreneurship skills are valuable to not only entrepreneurs but also to managers and others in careers in agricultural and related industries. Student teams work on projects with real businesses in all of our entrepreneurship courses. We also form teams around entrepreneurship projects that students bring to our classes. Students participate in poster and pitch contests judged by entrepreneurs and investors. We help students obtain seed-money for prototypes and start-ups, and we fund class-related expenses such as travel that are associated with team projects. We immerse students in our extensive agribusiness network and in the NC State entrepreneurship ecosystem.

RE: Anthropology Honors Program Revision

The Anthropology Program in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology requests approval of revisions to the Anthropology Honors Program. These revisions will not impact the Sociology Honors Program in the same department.

Current Admissions Requirements: Minimum 3.25 GPA overall and in Major* and 12 hours of ANT coursework

Proposed Admissions Requirements: Minimum 3.50 GPA overall and in Major and 12 hours of ANT coursework

Justification: One of the main functions of the honors program in anthropology is to help students prepare for graduate study in the discipline. In order to gain acceptance to a quality graduate program, students generally need a GPA of 3.5 or higher to have a reasonable chance of acceptance. The higher GPA will also show that the student can likely handle the extra work required in a graduate level course in the department, given their undergraduate courseload (see below).

Current Graduation Requirements: 12 hours total of honors credit

- 9 hours of undergraduate coursework taken for honors credit at the 300 or 400 level in ANT courses
- 3 hours of ANT 498H (Honors Independent Study) during which the honors thesis is written
- A minimum B grade in the courses taken for honors credit.
 - Honors thesis of 20-30 pages prepared under the supervision of a departmental faculty member

Proposed Graduation Requirements: 9 hours total of honors credit

- 6 hours of undergraduate coursework taken for honors credit at the 300 or 400 level in ANT courses
- 3 hours of master's level coursework (ANT 5XX) required.
- A minimum B+ grade in undergraduate courses taken for honors credit
- A minimum B grade in graduate courses taken for honors credit

Justification: Reducing the total number of hours taken for honors credit will permit more students, particularly transfer students, to meet the requirements of the department honors

program. The vast majority of anthropology majors are internal or external transfer students, giving them less time as matriculated majors. The current requirements are higher than the university requirements (three additional hours), and the extra hours make it difficult for some of our high quality majors to participate in the program because of time constraints after they transfer in as majors. By the time many of our students have taken the required 12 hours to be invited to the program, they do not have enough semesters left in their academic careers to complete the honors program requirements.

Substitution of a graduate level course for the honors thesis will serve two purposes. First, we believe it will be a valuable way to prepare for a graduate program by experiencing graduate level academic training while still an undergraduate student. Students who excel in this environment will gain confidence in their ability to succeed at the graduate level. Second, the student can request a reference letter from the course instructor who can comment upon their demonstrated ability to handle graduate level work, and compare their performance with other graduate students.

Increasing the grade requirements will ensure that graduate-school quality students are the ones who graduate with honors in the program. For those students who still want to do an honor's thesis project, they still have the option of participating in honor's programs at the university level.

Current Catalog Description (Anthropology and Sociology Combined):

In this program, outstanding majors pursue an individual program of study involving close working relationships with departmental faculty. Twelve credit hours of honors courses and an honors thesis will allow students to enhance their expertise in sociology, criminology, and anthropology. Honors courses combine nine hours of credit in regular classes, each with additional honors work, with a three-credit honors thesis done as an independent study in consultation with a faculty honors adviser.

To be admitted, students must have earned 12 hours in their major and have a 3.25 overall GPA and a 3.25 in the major. To graduate with Anthropology/Criminology/Sociology Honors, the student must have a 3.25 GPA overall and in the major. Successful completion of the program is noted on the student's transcript and at commencement.

Proposed Catalog Description (Anthropology):

In this program, outstanding majors pursue an individual program of study involving closer working relationships with departmental faculty. Nine credit hours of honors courses, including at least three hours at the master's level, will allow students to enhance their expertise in anthropology. Honors courses combine at least three hours of credit in regular undergraduate courses at the 300- or 400-level, each with additional honors work, along with three or six hours of credit taken at the graduate level, for a total of nine hours of honors credit.

To be admitted, students must have earned 12 hours in their major and have a 3.50 overall GPA and a 3.50 in the major. To graduate with Anthropology Honors, the student must have a 3.50 GPA overall and in the major. Successful completion of the program is noted on the student's transcript and at commencement.

Proposed Catalog Description (Sociology)

In this program, outstanding majors pursue an individual program of study involving close working relationships with departmental faculty. Twelve credit hours of honors courses and an honors thesis will allow students to enhance their expertise in sociology, criminology, and anthropology. Honors courses combine nine hours of credit in regular classes, each with additional honors work, with a three-credit honors thesis done as an independent study in consultation with a faculty honors adviser.

To be admitted, students must have earned 12 hours in their major and have a 3.25 overall GPA and a 3.25 in the major. To graduate with Criminology/Sociology Honors, the student must have a 3.25 GPA overall and in the major. Successful completion of the program is noted on the student's transcript and at commencement.

Justification: The change in requirements for the Anthropology Honors Program necessitates a change in the catalog description. Because the Sociology Honors Program will remain in its current form, it will be necessary to rewrite the catalog description for that program to remove references to the Anthropology Honors Program. The sociology graduate program offers most of its courses at the Ph.D. rather than the master's level, and therefore does not have enough 500 level courses available to make the same change in their program.

Number of Participants for the Last Five Years: 13

Note: The anthropology program has averaged more than 100 majors per year over the past five years, but the number of students completing the honors program has only been 2-3%. We hope that the changes proposed here will increase that number to at least 5% of majors, or approximately 5 students per year, and help to highlight the academic success of our strongest majors.

Justification Statement

Since 2010, the Language, Writing, and Rhetoric concentration has been one of the larger concentrations in the English major, accounting for a sizable proportion of the students in the major (see Figure 1).

At the time of its development and until recently, the Language, Writing, and Rhetoric (LWR) concentration was designed to offer a broad introduction to the fields of rhetoric, linguistics, writing studies, and journalism. However, since the last major revision to the LWR concentration in 2010, changes in the LWR student body, changes in the LWR faculty, and the recent development of a standalone English concentration in Linguistics has led the LWR faculty to consider a revision and refocusing of the curriculum. The proposed curricular revision builds on faculty strengths and speaks more directly to students' communicated needs, and those observed in the employment data for LWR alumni surveys.

LWR advisors commonly hear from students that they appreciate the flexibility of the LWR concentration but find it difficult to articulate their professional identities when they complete the concentration. Identifying and articulating the core knowledge, methods and techniques associated with their degree is a challenge. Although our alumni secure employment in professional writing, a curriculum redesign highlighting professional identity within rhetoric and professional writing will help advisors sharpen their students' awareness of professional identity, focus classroom objectives around the knowledge and skills to develop professional identities, and provide clarity to students when articulating their own professional qualities.

Among new and transfer students, the interest in rhetoric and professional writing (including journalism) has remained strong over the years, as enrollment numbers show. In response, the English department has continued to hire faculty to teach in the concentration area. Collectively, our LWR faculty specialize in Composition and Rhetoric, Multimodal Writing, Technical Communication, and Journalism. The redesigned curriculum is intended to build on faculty specializations.

Finally, the departure of the Linguistics faculty from the LWR concentration provides an opportunity to focus on cultivating professional identities in the LWR curriculum. Although we will still encourage students to take courses in Linguistics (and in the other English concentrations) it will be easier in the revised curriculum to frame those courses as contributions to a professional identity in Rhetoric and Professional Writing.

Careers for Students in Language, Writing, and Rhetoric

Employment data from LWR alumni show that a significant portion are taking positions related to written, multimodal communication in which a strong knowledge of rhetoric and the tools and methods of professional communication are beneficial.

Although there is a long tail of positions that LWR graduates take, data since 2010 show that the leading categories are:

- Professional writing (N = 18, 16% of reporting): "professional writing" is an umbrella term that describes a set of related positions that focus on writing or editing content about products, services, or data for customers or for internal uses in an organization. Some of the positions captured include: product writers, contract and grant writers, copywriters, content editors, and marketing writers.
- Technical writing (N = 17; 15% of reporting): writing where the focus of the position is more narrowly defined around documentation for technological products.
- Education (N = 11, 10% of reporting): most positions are teaching-related in NC public schools. A smaller percentage are in corporate training.
- Reporting and Public Communication (N = 9, 8% of reporting): some positions are in print, electronic, and broadcast media outlets, but a smaller percentage are also positions charged with communicating organizational news to various publics.

 Accounting/Finance (N = 5; 4% of reporting): most are writing related, focused on analyzing and summarizing financial and account information for clients.

Other writing-related positions in the data include web design and writing (N = 2), creative writing (N = 3), and various positions that involve processing, interpreting, and communicating data (e.g., project management). These positions and their distributions are also seen in our placement of students (regardless of concentration) in our Internship Program.

Proposed Changes

Below are the proposed changes to the LWR curriculum, each followed by a brief rationale.

Rationale: The change reflects a refocused curricular identity on Rhetoric and Professional Writing. In their junior or senior year, students may fulfill the Writing and Rhetorical Practice corequisite in one of three ways:

- Complete an Internship and satisfy course requirements for ENG 350 (or ENG 498)
- Complete EI 495
 (Independent Study in Entrepreneurship) with someone in the Entrepreneurship program
- Fulfill a Writing and Rhetorical Practice "contract" for one course taken in the "Methods, Strategies, and Contexts" category (300-level or above).

Rationale: The "Effective Communication," "Digital Technologies" and "LWR Electives" categories were too broad to capture the revised focus on core knowledge, methods, and practices in rhetoric and professional communication.

The new category "Core Concepts" allows students to choose two classes in potentially two different areas of rhetoric and professional writing. All courses in this category should present core concepts and allow students to practice core skills associated with writing and rhetoric.

The new category "Methods, Strategies, and Contexts of Rhetoric & Professional Writing" will allow students to choose three courses that build upon knowledge gained from courses in the "Core Concepts" category. Many "Core Concepts" classes are pre-requisites for courses in the "Methods, Strategies, and Contexts" category. All classes in this category will allow students to recognize and practice conventional methods and strategies of writing and rhetorical production.

The new co-requisite "Writing and Rhetorical Practice Contract" is modeled after the honors contract and is intended to provide all junior and senior RPW students with concrete, applied practice of the skills and knowledge they are developing in the RPW concentration.

Although the substance of the Writing and Rhetorical Practice Contract will differ by course and instructor, at a minimum all contracts should meet the following criteria. The contract:

 addresses a problem or opportunity that requires students to develop solutions or responses,

- · requires a project or paper intended for a defined audience,
- includes evaluation and feedback on the students' solutions or responses, and
- includes written reflection by the student about lessons learned

The project proposed for the "Writing and Rhetorical Practice" contract will replace or extend a project already assigned for a course.

Writing and Rhetorical Practice contracts should be created at the start of the semester and submitted no later than census day. Contracts should involve negotiation between the faculty member, the student, and the student's advisor. Signatures of all three parties are required on the contract form, which should be returned to the English Department's Director of Undergraduate Programs prior to the start of the semester (ideally) or no later than census day in the semester in which the contract is expected to be fulfilled. The Director of Undergraduate Programs will work with the H&SS Dean's Office to mark the contract course as fulfilling the "Writing and Rhetorical Practice" co-requisite.

Satisfactory completion of the course (with a grade no lower than C-) constitutes satisfactory completion of the contract and, therefore, satisfactory completion of the "Writing and Rhetorical Practice" co-requisite.

The other option for a student to complete the "Writing and Rhetorical Practice" co-requisite is to complete an internship either as ENG 350 or ENG 498 or to complete EI 495 (Independent Study in Entrepreneurship) under the guidance of someone in the Entrepreneurship program.

Budget/Resources

The revisions proposed in this memo are not expected to have any budgetary impact on the English Department. No additional resources will be required to implement these revisions.

All of the courses in the revised curricular plan are currently offered and taught by faculty and teaching assistants associated with the LWR program. The teaching staff includes 12 tenure track faculty members, 3 non tenure-track faculty members, and between 3-5 doctoral teaching assistants from the Communication, Rhetoric, and Digital Media program.

Re: Revision Requests for the FLL Arabic Major Concentration

Summary of Revisions:

- 1. Change of concentration title from "Arabic Language and Culture" to "Arabic Studies."
- 2. Combine current categories to streamline major concentration requirements:
 - Merge the Arabic Language Core (27 units) and Arabic Studies Concentration (8 units) into one section designated as Departmental Requirements. Total unit hours of (35) will be maintained.
 - Combine the currently designated 1-60 Arabic Studies Advanced Course (9 units) and 2-40 Arabic Studies Advised Electives (3 units) into one requirement entitled Arabic Studies Advised Electives.
 Total unit hours of (12) will be maintained although only 3 units may be taken at the 200-level.
- **3.** Add existing courses to the approved course list for *Arabic Studies Advised Electives*. Course descriptions and justifications are provided in (Justification 3.) below.
 - PS 236 Issues in Global Politics
 - PS 231 Introduction to International Relations
 - HI 381 NGOs-Nonprofits in Global Context
 - FL 436 Perspectives on English as a New Language
 - ENG 315 Phonetics
 - FL 395 Study Abroad Programs

Justifications:

- The change of title is in line with current trends in the field and more accurately represents the comprehensive scope of the major concentration. The title 'Arabic Studies' is consistent with current discipline recognition and other FLL major concentration titles.
- Reformatting of the major requirement lists will provide increased clarification of major requirements and is consistent with changes made to French Studies.
- 3. Courses to be added to the approved list of Arabic Studies Advised Electives.
- PS 236 and PS 231 provide important context for students majoring in Arabic. The student will develop a more in depth understanding of events and movements on the global stage and relevant interconnectivity with the Middle East. Catalog Description (PS236): Selected problems facing the world community, related

political issues, and international responses to them, including international trade, economic development, wars, arms control, terrorism, ethnic conflict, human rights, status of women, population growth, food security, and environmental degradation. Catalog Description (PS 231): Evolution of relations among nations and of the roles of the United Nations and other international institutions, including changes in the world political system since the end of the cold war.

- HI 381 NGOs-Nonprofits in Global Context. Many students majoring in Arabic have a keen interest in pursuing NGO and non-profit work in the Middle East upon graduation. This course offers the interested student a unique overview to better understand NGO global activity and systems and encourages professional development. Catalog Description: Non-Governmental Organizations [NGOs] are a crucial component and a revealing characteristic of the strength and effectiveness of a country's civil society. Examining their histories outside of the U.S. gives us a window into global culture, values, and modes of everyday life, and into notions about "charity" and "public good" in a given society. We will use India as a case study to develop a set of questions about how NGOs function in different societies, examining how researchers and activists partner with NGOs in different parts of the world to address pressing environmental, economic, social, and cultural-production issues.
- FL 436 Perspectives on English as a New Language Arabic majors interested in refugee resettlement work or teaching ESL in the Middle East will benefit from the overview provided in this course and encourages professional development. Catalog Description: Examination of the complexity of multiculturalism in American society and the challenges faced by immigrant families in adapting to U.S. institutions. Emphasis on understanding historical, legal, cultural and pedagogical issues with respect to learning English as a new language
- ENG 315 Phonetics Arabic majors interested in pursuing graduate work in Arabic linguistics will benefit from this important overview. This course encourages language expansion and professional development. Catalog Description: This course is an introduction to phonetics: how spoken language is produced and perceived, and the physical properties of speech. An understanding of phonetics is fundamental to scientific and clinical approaches to speech and language. This course is meant to build both skills and knowledge.
- FL 395 Study Abroad Programs For students participating in the Qasid program. Catalog Description: Specific category of courses involving language and/or culture taught in foreign countries through the Department Study Abroad Program.

Re: Convert Current Interdisciplinary Studies BS Plan to a Subplan

The College of Humanities and Social Sciences would like to create new subplans (concentrations) within the Interdisciplinary Studies Bachelor of Science plan. In order to do this in the most effective way possible, we must create a subplan to be used for what has been the primary plan since the plan's creation. Once we create this subplan, no students would matriculate into the primary plan. They would have to select and matriculate into one of the Interdisciplinary Studies-BS subplans. While making this change, we would like to change the plan code from 16LSMBS (a legacy code used in pre-SIS computing days) to 16IDSBS (a more logical code to mirror our 16IDSBA plan).

Historically, the primary plan has been for our Interdisciplinary Studies Bachelor of Science Self-Design Program. We have a parallel BA degree program in Interdisciplinary Studies. The BA program underwent changes in 2015 that led to the shift of the Self-Design plan as the primary plan to a subplan in order to enable the creation for other subplans under the plan. We now wish to do the same for the BS program. This will allow us to create a WGS subplan in our BS degree program that parallels the WGS subplan in our BA program, which will better facilitate double majoring between our college and STEM majors throughout the campus. This will also allow our unit to be more flexible and adaptive to new trends in the scholarship in interdisciplinary and cultural studies areas. Under the umbrella of Interdisciplinary Studies-BS, we will have the flexibility to pilot new programs such as one in development with the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

Much like the concentration model in many departments in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, each concentration will provide its own unique course work but will be guided by a shared curricular structure including cross-major requirements that teach the foundations of the fields, concentration and advanced concentration requirements that provide challenging disciplinary rigor, and opportunities for research in required capstone courses. Each concentration will draw on strengths of the core and affiliate faculty.

As has always been the case, students in the IDS Self-Design concentration (BA or BS degree) would not be able to use CODA to matriculate into the major. Rather, they would continue to use the more extensive application required for the Self-Design Program.

Although Self-Design does not follow a traditional, discipline-based model, as a subplan (concentration) it will continue to provide unique opportunities for problem-based research. Self-Design is an intensive opportunity for students, under the direction of faculty advisors and the Self-Design Advisory Committee, to explore the ways that different disciplines can inform contemporary challenges. For example, one Self Design-BS degree student combined courses in Communication, Global Public Health, Political

Science, and Women and Gender Studies to design a major in Global Health Communication and Development. Another student drew on courses in Agricultural Resource Economics; Nutrition; Science, Technology, and Society; and Social Work to create a major in Influence and Impacts of Agriculture and Food Systems. As a concentration within the Interdisciplinary Studies major, Self-Design will continue to provide valuable opportunities for a select group of students to employ the think and do model.

We foresee no impact on current Interdisciplinary Studies-BS degree students, who will graduate from their current degree program. New students who enter the Self-Design concentration will not see any curricular changes given that the program will maintain existing requirements as it is moved from the primary plan to a subplan.

Proposed effective date: Fall 2020

Justification and Proposed Revisions

This curricula action proposes the revision of 16PSBA (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science).

Revision of the above plan is justified because it produces a more balanced curriculum by emphasizing comparative political analysis as a core element of the discipline and requiring students to develop related competencies. The following changes accomplish this purpose:

- PS 241 (Comparative Politics) is added as a required course in the 16PSBA (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science) plan and all subplans.
- PS 241 is removed from the requirement details list for the International requirement.
- The requirement of 12.0 credit hours of PS electives is reduced to 9.0 credit hours of PS electives in order to offset the addition of the PS 241 requirement.
- The following courses are added to the Law and Justice/Public Policy requirement; PS 307 PS 308, PS 309, PS 312, PS 313, and PS 314 because the limited number of courses that appear on the requirement details list (i.e., PS 305 and PS 310) for the requirement are insufficient to allow students to sustain adequate progress toward their degrees.

Impact on Students

Current students in the major will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old curriculum. And new students to the major will take the same number of credit hours in the program as before.

SUBJECT: Curricula Action for Revision of 16PSBA-16PSAM

Proposed effective date: Fall 2020

Justification and Proposed Revisions

This curricula action proposes the revision of 16PSBA-16PSAM (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science-American Politics Concentration).

Revision of the above plan is justified because it produces a more balanced curriculum by emphasizing comparative political analysis as a core element of the discipline and requiring students to develop related competencies. The following changes accomplish this purpose:

- PS 241 (Comparative Politics) is added as a required course.
- PS 241 is removed from the requirement details list for the international requirement.
- The requirement of 6.0 credit hours of 300+ level PS electives is reduced to 3.0 credit hours of 300+PS electives in order to offset the addition of the PS 241 requirement.
- PS 361is removed from the requirement details list for Theory, leaving PS 362 as a required course.
- The following courses are added to the Law and Justice/Public Policy requirement; PS307 PS 308, PS 309, PS 312, PS 313, and PS 314. The addition of these courses is justified because the limited number of courses that appear on the requirement details list (i.e., PS 305 and PS 310) for the requirement are insufficient to allow students to sustain adequate progress toward their degrees.
- PS 203 is removed from the concentration electives requirement details list.
- PS 506 is added to the concentration seminar requirement details list.
- Update EC 205 requirement, allowing students the option of EC 202 or EC 205.

Impact on Students

Current students in the major will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old curriculum. And new students to the major will take the same number of credit hours in the program as before.

Proposed effective date: Fall 2020

Justification and Proposed Revisions

This curricula action proposes the revision of 16PSBA-16PSINT (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a concentration in international and comparative politics).

Revision of the above subplan is justified because it produces a more balanced curriculum by emphasizing comparative political analysis as a core element of the discipline and requiring students to develop related competencies. The following changes accomplish this purpose:

- PS 241 (Comparative Politics) is added as a required course.
- PS 241 is removed from the requirement details list for the International requirement.
- The requirement of 6.0 credit hours of PS 300-level or higher electives is reduced to 3.0 credit hours of PS 300-level or higher electives in order to offset the addition of the PS 241 requirement.
- The following courses are added to the Law and Justice/Public Policy requirement; PS307 PS 308, PS 309, PS 312, PS 313, and PS 314. This change is justified because the limited number of courses that appear on the requirement details list (i.e., PS 305 and PS 310) for the requirement are insufficient to allow students to sustain adequate progress toward their degrees.
- The following course is added to the comparative politics list, Regional Politics, in the concentration electives requirement: PS 447 (Russian Politics).
- The following courses are added to the requirement details list for the concentration seminar requirement: PS 447, PS 534, PS 542, PS 544, PS 546, PS 560, and PS 561.
- Update EC 205 requirement, allowing students the option of EC 202 or EC 205.

Impact on Students

Current students in the major will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old curriculum. And new students to the major will take the same number of credit hours in the program as before.

Proposed effective date: Fall 2020

Justification and Proposed Revisions

This curricula action proposes the revision of 16PSBA-16 PSLJ (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a concentration in law and justice).

Revision of the above subplan is justified because it produces a more balanced curriculum by emphasizing comparative political analysis as a core element of the discipline and requiring students to develop related competencies. The following changes accomplish this purpose:

- PS 241 (Comparative Politics) is added as a required course.
- PS 241 is removed from the requirement details list for the International requirement.
- The requirement of 9.0 credit hours of 300+ PS electives is reduced to 6.0 credit hours PS electives in order to offset the addition of the PS 241 requirement.

Impact on Students

Current students in the major will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old curriculum. And new students to the major will take the same number of credit hours in the program as before.

Proposed effective date: Fall 2020

Justification and Proposed Revisions

This curricula action proposes the revision of 16PSBA-16PSPUB (Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a concentration in public policy).

Revision of the above subplan is justified because it produces a more balanced curriculum by emphasizing comparative political analysis as a core element of the discipline and requiring students to develop related competencies. The following changes accomplish this purpose:

- PS 241 (Comparative Politics) is added as a required course.
- PS 241 is removed from the requirement details list for the International requirement.
- PS 471 is removed from the requirement details list for the Concentration Seminar.
- The requirement of 12.0 credit hours of PS Public Policy concentration electives is reduced to 9.0 credit hours of PS Public Policy concentration electives in order to offset the addition of the PS 241 requirement.
- The following courses are added to the requirement details list for the concentration seminar: PS 415, PS 431, PS 432, PS 433, PS 445, PS 463, PS 506, PS 507, PA 511.
- Update EC 205 requirement, allowing students the option of EC 202 or EC 205.

Impact on Students

Current students in the major will not be affected by the revision. They can continue under the old curriculum. And new students to the major will take the same number of credit hours in the program as before.
