- a. Working group to further explore collaboration models (Uganda as a case), compare an institutional partnership model with an outpost model:

- b. Global Gateway Network Development
  - i. Review the existing Global Gateway Network with offices established in various countries (5-6).
  - ii. Arrange a meeting with Alexander Batten, the Global Gateway Network Director, to explore possibilities for network development.
  - iii. Discuss the process of identifying suitable locations, staffing requirements, operational setup, and sustainability strategies.
- c. Exploring Opportunities at the European Center in Prague:
  - i. Investigate the student-centered approach at the European Center in Prague.
  - ii. Identify areas for enhancing research and capacity-building opportunities.
- d. Potential for Embedded Office at Another University:
  - i. Assess the feasibility of establishing an embedded office within another university.

- 3. DRAFT: Advancing International Research Collaboration
  - i. Framework for white paper
  - ii. Updates on USAID conversation
- 4. Next steps on this draft Topics
  - a. Payroll and Taxation:
    - i. Discussion on paying individuals in other countries and related policies.
    - ii. Example scenarios discussed include trips to Kenya and the Philippines.
  - b. Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) for International Partnerships:
    - i. Need for comprehensive SOP addressing FAQs and pain points in international collaborations.
    - ii. Proposal to include expertise from the business office in navigating international partnerships.
  - c. Building Institutional Knowledge:
    - Recognizing the uniqueness of each situation and the need to build institutional knowledge.
    - ii. Proposal to gather information through Google Form or Qualtrics from internationally-active faculty.
  - d. MoveOn Implementation:
    - i. Proposal to implement MoveOn as a repository of international activities.

- ii. Plan to track productivity of partners for better collaboration and project integration.
- e. Flexibility in Institutional Agreements:
  - i. Discussion on flexibility in institutional agreements, especially concerning grant acquisition.
  - ii. Proposal for MOU template designed by the university to expedite agreements at the college level.
- f. IRB Mechanism:
  - i. Explanation of IRB process, including requirements for review from collaborating institutions.
- g. Cultural Practices:
  - i. Addressing concerns regarding customs such as offering drinks to guests from countries where it is customary.
  - ii. Clarification on payment policies for alcohol and food.
- 5. Matters Arising for Group
  - a. MOU Process:
    - Emphasized the importance of MOUs for faculty collaborations with other universities.
    - Clarification that all international agreements must go through the Office of Global Engagement.
  - b. International Research Engagement:
    - i. Highlighted the extension agreement with Malawi as an example of international research collaboration.
    - ii. Discussion on fostering exchange and opportunities with the university's extension arm in other countries.
  - c. Focus on Extension in CALS:
    - Recognition of CALS' specialization in extension services and its importance in international engagements.
    - ii. Emphasized the significance of both research and extension as differentiators for NC State.
  - d. Challenges in Study Abroad Recruitment:
    - i. Noted difficulties in recruiting students for Study Abroad programs in recent years.
    - ii. Positive evaluations but low student enrollment raise questions about recruitment strategies.
  - e. Managing Offers and Demand:
    - i. Proposal to manage offers and demand for Study Abroad programs effectively.
    - ii. Discussion on eliminating competition between various Study Abroad programs at NC State.
  - f. Faculty Engagement in Study Abroad:
    - i. Emphasized the role of faculty as key advocates for Study Abroad programs.
    - ii. Proposed stronger collaboration between faculty and the Study Abroad office for program promotion.
  - g. Sharing Study Abroad Insights:
    - i. Suggestion for Julia to share insights and initiatives undertaken by the Study Abroad office.
